Head: Understanding the Bible

- 1) Read 2 Samuel 11. Is there anything about the text you do not understand? Does it stir any immediate thoughts, emotions or questions?
- 2) How does the story indicate that David is about to do something foolish?
- 3) Read Psalm 51:1-4, 12. What does David say is the root cause of why he did this?
- 4) Read 2 Samuel 12:7-10. How does God describe David's sin? What is David's disposition towards God in the midst of his evil and sin? (vs. 10)
- 5) What is sloth? Where do we see the sin of sloth in David's actions in 2 Samuel 11?
