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"That God is jealous for our love is the greatest compliment he could possibly pay us." ~Abraham Kuyper

- 1) Read Matthew 9:14-17. What is in this passage that surprises, encourages or frustrates you?
- 2) What is comforting about the metaphor of Jesus being your Bridegroom? What's restricting about it? What's new? Reflect together on the Kuyper quote above.
- 3) Where are you struggling to experience the wedding joy of Jesus' presence in your life? When do you often forget His delight in being your beloved? How is this both a present reality and our hope? What does Jesus think about at a feast? How can we imitate him in this?
- 4) For more discussion, read and talk about the following passages: Isaiah 54:5-8; Hosea 2:16-23. How are these promises true now in Jesus? How are they still future?
- 5) Reflect on this quote from the sermon:

Who then can value highly enough these royal nuptials? Who can comprehend the riches of the glory of this grace? **Christ, that rich and pious husband, takes as a wife a needy and impious harlot, redeeming her from all her evils, and supplying her with all His good things**. It is impossible now that her sins should destroy her, since they have been laid upon Christ and swallowed up in Him, and since she has in her husband Christ a righteousness which she may claim as her own, and which she can set up with confidence against all her sins, against death and hell, saying: **"If I have sinned, my Christ, in whom I believe, has not sinned; all mine is His, and all His is mine;" as it is written, "My beloved is mine, and I am his. (Songs 2:16)** This is what Paul says: "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ;" victory over sin and death, as he says: "The sting of death is sin, and the strength of sin is the law." ~Martin Luther
